#### **Student Leadership**

Having a strong and positive student voice is a sign of a thriving school. I am very proud to write that leadership at JJCMHS continues to grow. More students are expressing interest in taking on leadership roles. This year we made the decision that all our student leaders will be provided with a school blazer. The blazer includes the students name and the role that they have in the leadership team.

#### **School Uniform**

As you know our school is in the process of changing uniforms. Our previous supplier was Lowes at EastGardens. Our new supplier is Daylight. A significant change is that JJCMHS purchases the uniforms from Daylight and will then sell them from the school. This means that it will be easier for families to purchase uniforms.

We have had an extended process of consultation about changes to our uniform. We need to get it right so that students have a uniform that is comfortable, durable and one they like to wear. The new uniform is currently in production but will not be available until the middle of term 3. While we are changing uniforms, we have informed families that students are to in the first option purchase the

old uniform. If that is not possible due to stock not being available families need to purchase items that match as closely as possible the old uniform. Same colour, appearance, and style. Please help by encouraging your children to come to school in clothes that match our current uniform as closely as possible.

#### Attendance

"Regular attendance at school for every student is essential if students are to achieve their potential and increase their career and life options.". **DoE Attendance Policy, 2014** 

It is very important that students attend school everyday unless they have a valid reason. The more school students miss the more they will fall behind in their learning. As a parent you can have a significant impact upon your children's attendance. Please work with the school to support better attendance. What can you do to help with this?

- Establish expectations in the home about the importance of school attendance.
- Support your child in establishing good sleep habits.
- Set clear expectations around technology use, particularly technology in the bedroom. There is very clear evidence that this is a significant factor that impacts the sleep of young people.
- Teach good routines so that they are organised, i.e. getting clothes ready the night before, preparing lunch, waking up in sufficient time to get ready for school.

An important part of attendance is getting to school on time. School starts at 8:50am for most students. Some senior classes start earlier. So, if students have an early class they will need to plan to leave home earlier. Other senior classes will extend beyond 3:00pm. It is essential that students attend these lessons if they want to achieve all the outcomes of the course.

It is important to be on time otherwise students miss out on important information during homeroom and roll call. They also miss out on building the positive connection with their home room teacher who is there to be that friendly welcoming face for students when they arrive at school. If students are arriving later that the start of period 1, 9:00 am they will miss the beginning of the first lesson of the day. This disrupts the learning of other students and makes it hard for a student to know what is happening in a lesson.

HSIE as always is having a busy and exciting term, all courses have completed their first or second assessment tasks. Students have been taking their learning and classwork seriously. We also had a wonderful Harmony Week and Harmony Assembly where SRC students and HSIE teachers led a powerful assembly to celebrate diversity in our school and we thank Together for Humanity for their continued support and for the powerful words of the guest speaker Calisha Bennet.

To finish the term off Year 10 attended the Jewish museum to support the learning of the current topic the Holocaust. Students had the opportunity to listen to the testimony of Mark Spigelman, a Polish born survivor of the Holocaust. While he was only quite young during the events of the Holocaust, Mark spoke of his early memories in the small village of Bedzin, and of all of the stories and experiences of his family. These included hiding in a makeshift bunker in the ghettos, being smuggled in a sack by his father, and even being disguised as a girl to avoid being identified as a young Jewish boy. Part of Mark's experiences can be found in the Pulitzer Prize winning graphic novel "Maus", which was written by his cousin Art Spiegelman. Mark currently lives in Maroubra and has been living in Australia for over 70 years. His final words of advice for our Year 10 students were "Never hate. Sure, you can dislike people, but you should never hate anyone for simply being who they are."

This was then followed by a final school assembly led by the HSIE faculty and our SRC to commemorate Australia's veterans with an ANZAC Day assembly.

There will be a change to staffing, Ms Batista De Mello will now be relieving as Deputy Principal Community for the rest of the year, from Term 2, Week 2 we welcome Ms Kharitos as relieving Head Teacher HSIE/PDHPE/Sport from term 2 and Mr McGuire will take over Ms Batista De Mello's Year 7-11 classes. ## **Compulsory school attendance**

#### Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

# What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

# The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

# What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

#### Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

# My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

# What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

• Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

• Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

# What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

#### Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.
