### From the Principal

Year 12 - Class of 2023

### **Mobile Phone Policy**

As you know there is a new policy for mobile phones. This policy has been rolled out across all public schools in NSW. This policy will bring NSW in line with South Australia, Northern Territory, Victoria and Western Australia. All principals across the state have the responsibility of implementing this policy in their school. As principal of JJCMHS, I am responsible for this task.

I am doing a soft launch of this policy over the first 2 weeks of school where we will expect students to follow the expectation but not apply consequences for students who do not follow the expectation. This will allow the school community time to adjust to the change and iron out any logistical issues. Thank you for working with the school to help us with these changes.

I have been emailing parents and carers with details. I will send out the school processes for how we implement the policy in week 2 term 4. I sent Frequently Asked Questions to parents and carers via email. Please read this. It will help answer some of the questions you may have. Below is a summary of the expectations:

- Mobile phones must be switched off at the school gate and not be used for the duration of the school day until the students leave the school grounds.
- The expectation for mobile phones is not limited to the school but may also be applied on school excursions and other school events.
- Students will not be able to use their phone to pay at the canteen but will need to look for other
  options such as cash, credit card or debit cards.
- Exemptions can be applied for based on wellbeing, health or learning needs but the decision to approve these exceptions is at the discretion of the principal. We will as much as possible look for other options here.
- We will send out the forms for you to apply for exemption and put them on our school's website.
  The form will require documentation from a specialist for it to be considered. If your child uses
  the phone as a wellbeing tool, we will ask you to meet with the paediatrician to investigate other
  tools to support their wellbeing.


### Wellbeing

This term we offered our students a wide range of Wellbeing focused activities to build resilience and raise awareness of the variety of services on offer to students.

### P&C

This term we have been very fortunate to have more success born from the partnership we have developed with our Parenst & Citizens Association. Our P&C has grown this year, in both its numbers as well as its engagement with the school and our community.

Working closely with our P&C we have fostered a positive and forward-focused mindset for building upon our incremental successes, and showcasing more of what makes JJ a vibrant and unique learning environment for a diverse range of students. With the P&C now being incorporated, meaning it has the ability to own assets and apply for government grants, it now has a stronger ability to directly support the school. This close-knit partnership was even featured by the NSW Department of Education as a case study for our schools can successfully leverage such a bond to support its learners:

As principal Ralph David says, 'we focus on community, we are thinking beyond the school gates.' They've had families involved in the past, but not in a formal way. Now the P&C is incorporated, writes grants to support the school and is increasing its membership, all with a focus on supporting the school and students.

P&C Association President Daniel Girling-Butcher said he liked Ralph's openness and confidence from the first time they met on a school tour and believes many parents are attracted to the P&C because of Ralph's vision. Parents appreciate what the school offers and as part of the P&C they're there to assist the school. 'It' a collaborative approach, we approach everything together.' said Daniel.

When they started working together, they were both novices. Each used their strengths for a collective goal of supporting the students and school. Daniel has community connections, so he invited other parents to get involved. They started with 3 or 4 people and now have more than a dozen parents regularly attending. They create an inclusive and welcoming environment and families can join meetings in person or online.

Our P&C is always happily acepting new members, and regularly meets on Wednesday evenings each term in Weeks 3 and 8.

### Visual Arts and Photographic and Digital Media

The Senior Visual Arts Studio has been a hive of activity this term as Year 12 have worked towards the completion of their Bodies of Work. Congratulations to Keisha, Hilton, Metin, Milton, Natalia, Heidi, Bea and Christian who have, between them, created an impressive range of artworks showcasing their practice as artists and engagement with Visual Arts content. With their teacher Ms McInnes, these students have worked over weekends and during school holidays, making the most of opportunities provided to them to maximise their results. We wish them all the best with their NESA assessment and look forward to exhibiting their artworks at the end of the year in the Big Night Out exhibition.

In other news, Year 11 students have now completed their Preliminary course and will be embarking on their own journey with the Body of Work next term. Over Term 3 they have studied Postmodernism and learnt about artists that challenge existing paradigms in the artworld. This learning was enhanced by our excursion to the Powerhouse Museum to study the Paradise Camp exhibition by Yuki Kihara. Year 10 Visual Arts students are currently engaged in a unit of work examining art that responds to social issues. They are creating their own artworks on skateboard decks in response to a social issue that is of personal interest to them.

Year 9 Visual Arts students are creating artworks in a range of mediums in response to the urban environment. Earlier in the term they went on an excursion around Mascot and took photos to document the architecture of the local area. These photos have formed the basis of their artmaking tasks, including detailed lino prints.

In the Photographic and Digital Media course, Year 9 students have been engaged in a film making task for the term. Each group has developed their own short film using the signature item 'window'. Year 8 Visual Arts students are learning about Street Art this semester and have used photographic processes in the darkroom to create works inspired by Street Art. They are also studying artworks by Australian Street Artists, some of which can be found in nearby areas.

Year 7 Visual Arts have learnt about Mulga the Artist and have created a wonderful range of paintings inspired by his bright colours, use of Australian animals and humorous take on Australian culture.

### English & LOTE

Our faculty has had a busy term with preparing our Year 12 students for their HSC. The term started with HSC Trials, and followed with a strong focus on revising content and skills in preparation for the upcoming HSC examinations, ensuring each and every student feels confident ending their high school journey and embarking on their next chapter.

### **Botany Bay Public Speaking Competition**

In week 9, Ms Kharitos had the pleasure of adjudicating the final round of the Stage 1 and Stage 2 Public Speaking Competition at Eastlakes Public School. The level of the speeches, both prepared and impromptu, was incredible and it was a great opportunity to meet with some of our future students and hear them articulate their views on a variety of topics.

### Drama

Year 8 English engaged with a Drama topic this term where they were introduced to the works of William Shakespeare, using A Midsummer Nights' Dream as a text for performance. Students learned about the principals of Drama, focussing on performance craft and experiential learning. All students achieved success in adapting the play script for performance and critical and analytical understanding, building their confidence in English and in their understanding of the challenges of script work and Shakespeare.

Year 9 Drama this term explored the conventions and history of Australian and Western threatre from the late 1800s and into the 1900s. The class developed their skills in using their bodies to convey emotions and depict obvious character relationships using the performance style of Vaudeville and Melodrama. In doing so, the class were able to make connections to the influences this style of performance has had over modern media, in particular Sit-coms like Seinfeld, Friends, The Big Bang Theory and others.

### **Chilean Cultural Excursion**

Year 8 Spanish students were lucky to have an authentic Chilean experience at "Pochito" right here in our local community. Paulina, the owner, led the students through a traditional sampling of empanadas, sopaipillas, calzones rotos and mote con huesillo. She explained that Chileans show their love to others through food with the aim for guests to feel happy and content, which translates to "pochito". Students were able to practise their Spanish and connect their learning in the classroom with the local Spanish speaking community.

### **English Head Teacher Association Conference**

The new English syllabus orients us towards the 'power, purpose, value and art' of subject English (NESA 2022), and our English faculty has been busy with curriculum planning and resourcing for implementation in 2024, for years 7- 10. Head Teacher James Nicolls and Tamara Tickle represented our faculty at the 'Lead, learn, empower' themed conference to enhance our collective faculty knowledge of evidence-based practice approaches, resources, strategies and innovations in English pedagogy. This 2-day conference enabled our colleagues to review innovative practices and begin enacting the vision of the new syllabus to plan for the coming years.

From all of us a heartfelt farewell to the class of 2023, we wish you all the best in your next chapter and remember...






