SOME INFO ABOUT JJ CAHILL'S SCHOOL COUNSELLING TEAM!

JJ Cahill Memorial High School has two School Counsellors, Mr Paul Miljak and Ms Sarah Coffey. Paul is available on Monday and Sarah is available Thursday and on Friday mornings. The School Counsellors can provide support in many areas, including:

Relationships with family Healthy romantic relationships Friends Sexuality Identity Body image Getting along with other students Getting along with teachers Different learning needs Meeting academic potential Managing the HSC Planning post-school options Health concerns Depression Anxiety or stress Anger Being a carer Drug and Alcohol use Grief or loss

Appointments are generally made on a "first come, first serve" basis, but priority will be given to students who have a good track record of keeping appointments and students who may require more urgent attention.

Appointments to see the School Counsellors can be made by:

- 1. Requesting an appointment with the Year Advisor, Deputy Principal, Head Teacher Welfare or Principal, who will contact the School Counsellor directly.
- 2. Direct contact with the School Counsellor before school, during recess or at lunch (pending availability)
- 3. Leaving a note under the door of the School Counsellors' office with full name and grade.
- 4. Sending an email (sarah.coffey5@det.nsw.edu.au) including student's full name and grade. Please note that due to time constraints, email based counselling services unfortunately cannot be offered.
- 5. Telephoning the school (9669 5118) and either leaving a voicemail or speaking to the School Counsellor directly.

Privacy is obviously very important to people when they speak with a Counsellor. The School Counselling service operates under the ethical principle of Confidentiality (within legal constraints), and the School Counsellor will discuss this with students in the first session.

IMPROVING LITERACY PROJECT

JJ Cahill MHS was fortunate enough to be selected to participate in a National Partnership with the Federal Government focused on improving literacy outcomes. Our school has been given significant funds to support a range of programs and professional learning to refine the teaching and learning of comprehension skills across all subjects and years.

Students in Stage 4 have undergone an assessment of their reading and comprehension skills. This process was very informative for both students and staff. We look forward to sharing these results with parents during the up-coming parent/teacher interviews.

In Stage 4 English classes, students are now engaged in an ongoing 'DEAR' (Drop Everything And Read) Program which supports reading fluency and accuracy. This program also explicitly focuses on the development of comprehension skills. In addition to this, all teaching staff have joined together in literacy buddies. These are pairs or triplets of teachers from different subject areas working together to develop, implement and evaluate strategies for the explicit teaching of reading and comprehension strategies.

This is an exciting development at JJ Cahill which is fostering a great collegial atmosphere focused on improving literacy outcomes for our students. We all look forward to what this National Partnership can do for the reading and comprehension skills of our students and the impact this can have on their overall engagement and achievement at school.

Stockings	Navy opaque 70 denier only. No Black permitted. Not to be worn with socks.	
Skirt	Tartan box pleat of a suitable length nor more than 10cms from the bottom of the knee. Skirts are not to be hitched up or rolled down.	
Shirt	Junior Boys (Yrs 7 – 10) – sky blue short or long sleeved with collar and buttoned front.
