abreast of the requirements for senior students to support them and keep them motivated as they manage their study and assessment commitments.

Timetables were given out in the first week. Each student has their own copy but these need to be looked after and it is recommended that the timetable be written in the school diary. This should be in pencil as our changing enrolments could mean that there will be a new timetable in the next few weeks. If lost, a replacement copy of the timetable will cost students \$1 at the office.

Students need to be working to the best of their ability to ensure they achieve success in the HSC. Marks need to be kept high for all students. This ensures our school cohort has a good mean. Obviously, students need to be focusing on individual achievement but at the same time consider the responsibility they have for their colleagues. EXCELLENCE is one of our school's three core values. All students should be aiming to do their personal best.

CONTINUED HSC SUCCESS

Congratulations to our students in Year 12 2013, who worked consistently in their senior years, and achieved success. A number of our students have gained entry to university and others have been successful in gaining placement at TAFE or other tertiary education providers. This great effort continued the fine record our Year 12 students have set over recent years.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

There are many opportunities for all our students but these are valueless if students do not make the most of them and that includes what happens every day in the classroom. Respect includes treating others fairly and courteously, remembering to say please, excuse me and thank you.

ACCEPTING RESPONSIBILITY AND 'DOING THE RIGHT THING'

School starts at 8.45am when roll call and morning assembly takes place. Students are not to be at school before 8.30am as there is no supervision. Any playground incidents, after arriving from 8.30am, should be reported to the office. Administrative staff will then contact teaching staff. Students are reminded to be well behaved and to act responsibly at all times, including as they make their way to and from school.

BIKE RIDING

Our Student Representative Council (SRC) has provided bike racks for the purpose of storing bikes for those who make their way to school this way. Students should obtain an information package from the office and complete an agreement to avail themselves of this privilege. Helmets must be worn at all times whilst on a bike. Scooters and skate boards are banned from the school due to safety issues.

SPORT

Sport costs are to be paid in advance for the year. This payment will cover all aspects of sport. Prompt payment will mean your child will have preference for first choice. There will be opportunities for knock-out teams as the term progresses so if students have skills in a particular area, they need to be paying attention on assembly and reading the newsletters when they are distributed.

HELPING STUDENTS TO BE ORGANISED – SCHOOL DIARIES.

To ensure good organisation and to provide information about our school and about learning that can be referred to on a regular basis, all students have been provided with a school diary.

Regular checks will be carried out to ensure students are using these productively, maintaining good habits in preparation for the HSC.


LOTS OF LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES, INCLUDING HOMEWORK.

Students should write up their homework in each lesson and attend to this when they arrive home after school. If there is no homework, students should be forming a habit of reading through what they have written in class throughout the day and practising any difficult tasks or formulas. When you analyse the amount of work covered in any given day and multiply that by the days in the week then the number of weeks in a year, there is certainly a lot of information students have to remember.

Long term memory is much more reliable than short term memory and crammed information. Of course homework needs to be balanced by some exercise, fresh air and healthy food. A mistake many students make is that they turn television on as soon as they arrive home or they turn the computer on and start playing games. Whilst these games can develop skills they can also be addictive and time wasting.

LOCKERS

Our SRC have purchased lockers for students to store their school gear, thus preventing heavy bags and books being carried from lesson to lesson throughout the day. Basketballs and footballs may also be stored during lesson time. Lockers are available for hire for \$30 per year plus a \$10 bond and the purchase of a combination lock. Students who have hired a locker in 2013 need to renew the hiring by paying this fee by Monday 17 February. After this date, locks will be removed from the lockers to allow others to use them. As there is currently insufficient for each student to have a locker, the demand will be high, particularly with Year 7 having already had these offered to them. It will be on a first in first served basis.





Applications need to be completed prior to hiring and these may be obtained from the office.

LOOK SMART, BE PROUD OF YOUR SCHOOL.

Please ensure that correct uniform is worn. All items are available from either the school or our supplier, Berelle, at Maroubra. Repeated infringements will incur a penalty so please make sure you have all the items needed. For all students this includes the correct sport/PE uniform for Sport and PD/H/PE lessons. Sports shoes need to be all white leather as stated in our uniform policy. These are available from Mathers and Williams shoe shops at Eastgardens. Paul's Warehouse also have many styles available (can order online).

For all boys it is compulsory to wear the shirts with the school's emblem embroidered on the pocket. For girls it is compulsory to wear the school blouse. Berelle supplies both these items. There is limited stock of the girls' blouses at school.

The supply of girls' trousers has caused concern as the style is no longer available and the new style is not regarded as being complimentary to the many shapes of our female students. The uniform committee will be considering options including just having a skirt rather than the trouser option. If your daughter's size is unavailable at Berelle she will need to wear a skirt until further notice.

For all girls, the length of the skirt is to be no more than 10cms above the bottom of the knee. Please ensure that hems are not cut, to allow for this. Skirts should also not be hitched or rolled up at the waist or on the hips. A number of complaints have been received regarding the skirts being too short causing embarrassment for those behind particularly whilst walking up the stairways.

School shoes are to be plain black and covered -in, to meet Department of Education and Communities (DEC) safety requirements. In line with my legal responsibility as site manager, students who are not wearing the correct shoes will be withdrawn from the classroom and will not be able to return until they meet DEC requirements. Senior students may be sent home to change into uniform.

SUBJECT FEES AND CONTRIBUTIONS

Thank you to the many parents who have paid these. All subject fees are to be paid if students wish to continue in the courses selected. For those who have not, please make sure they are paid promptly. Materials are purchased in bulk to keep costs down and assist our families but we also need to pay our bills.

GREAT BOOKS TO BORROW – LIBRARY BOOKS AND TEXTBOOKS

Students have access to lots of interesting books in our school library. Of particular importance is the textbook and library levy. This levy of \$50 for junior years and \$100 for senior years allows for overnight borrowing and includes a refundable deposit of 60% that students can access when all books are returned in good condition when they eventually leave the school. Year 11 students need to top up the junior levy by the payment of an additional \$50 to bring the total levy to \$100.

PRINTING FEE

The computer fee of \$30 includes \$10 worth of credit for printing and photocopying. Students will not be able to print at school unless this levy is paid. Keeping abreast with changes in technology, our copier in the school has a colour printing facility and will allow for printing from USBs as well as the school network. Students can find out more about what they can print when they visit the library.

BE PREPARED – EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENTS

These are listed in the student handbook that has been distributed. If any student has not received one, they are able to collect a copy from the office. Having a single book for all subjects is not satisfactory. An A4 folder with booklets in sections usually works well for senior students. The trend of handbags being brought to school is not acceptable (for boys or girls). Particularly at senior level it is expected that students are serious in their academic pursuits especially in regard to taking down notes and keeping well organised folders at home in order to study and prepare assessment tasks of a high standard.



MOBILE PHONES AND OTHER ELECTRONIC EQUIPMENT

A reminder to everyone that students are strongly discouraged from bringing the above to school. If this unavoidable, they are to be turned off at all times except at recess and lunch times. Communication between students and parents

during class times is to be via the office. No responsibility will be taken for these items as they

are not part of the school's requirements, they are expensive and our staff do not have time to devote to following up on them when the go missing. The advice is that it is best to leave them at home.

A GREAT ATTITUDE AND POSITIVE START

A positive start is what everyone wants for our students. Students need to start with all the right gear – uniform, books, a polite manner, and a great attitude to school and learning.


