Dark Fires Shall Burn


Inspired by the true events of an unsolved murder, Sydney, 1946.

Eleven-year-old Frances and her best friend, Nancy, are growing up in the doglegged streets of Newtown and into a world they do not understand. It is the aftermath of World War II, and thousands of damaged soldiers have returned to their homes, bearing the psychological scars of battle with them.

Meanwhile, in the seediest part of the city, fifteen-year-old Templeton lives amid bootleggers, gangs, and prostitutes with his sister Annie and her friends. Threatened by Annie's abusive lover, the nefarious Jack Tooth, they are forced to seek protection from a Darlinghurst madam: the once-powerful grog runner Dolly Jenkins. Soon, Templeton is drawn into an enigmatic underbelly of violence, sexuality, and secrets.

When Frances witnesses a shooting one night, these two worlds become inevitably intertwined. Templeton and the girls must grow up quickly and confront the darkness in the lives of those around them.

A WORD FROM MR POTTER RE CAREERS OPPORTUNITIES

Year 10 students are strongly advised to organise work experience during the up and coming school holidays if they have not already done so. This will be Year 10 students' second opportunity for work experience this year and will take place in Term 4, week 9, 5th-9th December. All information including the **Student Placement Record** can be found on the schools' website under "Curriculum & Activities">" Student Career Development">" Work Experience".

By the end of this term all <u>Year 12</u> students will have had 2 interviews, a *HSC progress interview* by either Mr Bosco or Ms Hallahan, and an *exit interview* by Mr Potter to support students with post-school work and/or study goals and direction. VET CONSTRUCTION STUDENTS COMPLETE THEIR WORK PLACEMENTS

Year 11 students have completed a one-week work placement in the eastern suburbs giving them access to what really happens on a construction site. Local builders have kindly given up their time to allow JJ students to participate in construction activities.

Milan Vuksanovic said, "I participated in the construction of a house at Clovelly. It was interesting to see how these projects work when you are on site. It has strengthened my interest in a possible future in the industry, " while Michael Goumas said after his placement, "This may not be the job for me into the future, but I will focus on achieving a good result at school."

Work place learning programs form part of the NSW secondary school curriculum. They enable students to spend a planned period of time in a workplace, enhancing their classroom learning, assisting their career choices and building their industry skills. They do this while completing their HSC and the option of completing an exam to contribute towards their ATAR.

Workplace learning helps students to:

- Test their job and career choices
- Engage with the wider community
- Complete course work in relevant industry setting
- Learn what employers want in their workforce

This qualification provides a pathway to primary trades in the construction industry with the exception of plumbing. Trade outcomes are predominantly achieved through the Australian Apprenticeship and this Certificate II allows for inclusion of skills suited for entry to off-site occupations, such as joinery and shop fitting as well as carpentry, bricklaying and other occupations in general construction.

VET HOSPITALITY REPORT

Following a long, difficult process and a Herculean effort from Mr Topping (Head Teacher VET), JJ Cahill Memorial High now has a wonderful new kitchen. The new kitchen boasts full stainless steel benches, brand new gas stoves and a



commercial dishwasher. The project has been ongoing for quite an extended period of time and was a project that the previous Principal, Mrs Robyn Cowin, dearly wanted to see completed before her leave.

This facility will allow the Hospitality students to access a realistic, real world environment in which to complete their competencies towards a Certificate III in Hospitality, Food & Beverage. Ms Morris has been waiting all term for the kitchen to be finished and is excited at the opportunity to take classes into the brand new kitchen next term. EVEN MORE COMPUTERS NOW AVAILABLE AT JJ!

This term saw the installation of 40 new computers into two new computer labs (one pictured, right), bringing the total learning spaces containing computers for student use to six. This will allow much greater access to computers by more classes throughout each and every day. Having a total of 120 computers available for student access gives JJ Cahill Memorial High a computer to student ratio of 1:3 which is much higher than most schools in the local area. This installation come at a cost of \$25,000 and has been well received by both staff and students alike. This follows on from the installation of 21 Interactive White Boards over the last 12 months, demonstrating our commitment as a school to technology and the future of your children's education.

Incomplete assignments may result in a student not achieving particular outcomes and will put at risk the award of a ROSA.

RESILIENCE

Resilience is such an important skill and Year 9 students are by now very familiar with the concept. Knowing about resilience and being resilient, however, can be two very different things. Being knocked back for a job, performing below your expectations on a test or assessment or peer conflict are all situations in which students need to exercise their resilience. Resilience is also developed through support from home. Students need to have self-confidence, to persevere, and have high expectations of their academic and social achievements. They will do this by being supported at school and at home. Take the upcoming holidays as an opportunity to begin conversations about being resilient, persevering at school and setting the bar high for academic achievement. Most of all, come back refreshed and ready to rip in.

YEAR 11

All year 11 students were recently interviewed to help support their academic achievement by identifying any barriers that are holding them back. It is important to address any issues early as all too often they can become more difficult to deal with as time goes by, especially once students are in Year 12. Areas that were discussed were <u>attendance</u>, <u>motivation</u>, <u>study habits</u>, <u>current achievement</u>, and <u>career goals</u> that drive students towards the bigger picture of life after school.

The *Crossroads* program will be run the first week in term 4 for all Year 11. This mandatory Stage 6 program focuses on preparing students for the pressures of the 'real world', and includes such topics as the dangers of drugs and alcohol, safe travel and partying, positive relationships and having a positive self-identity.

This year we have also chosen to include a full day safe driving workshop, run by Rotary International. This is a full-day, theory-based training course designed to help young people become more aware of the need for safety and responsible driving on our roads. Students are not required to have any driving experience or to hold a driving permit in order to take part in this course. The NSW Fire Department will also be running their *Rescue Ed. Program* within the crossroads program and this involve a simulated car crash and passenger rescue using the "Jaws of Life".

Students will be issued with a mentor in Term 4 who is a staff member who is willing to support and guide their student towards achievement in the areas mentioned in the paragraph above. Students should be aware that every effort will be made to provide a mentor who the students have identified but it may not be possible for all students to get the teacher mentor that they have identified due to staff unavailability.


