#### Parents and Citizens Association meetings for 2020.

Students made these tools following strict size/ dimensions, as well as safe and careful construction techniques.......... further skills for life!




#### 8B Technology Mandatory

Students in this class have completed their latest project – the electronic "Skill Tester" which is a game of skill to see if the player can move the wand along a hilly track from start to finish without setting off the light alarm. Mr David joined the class to see how they were going as a few students demonstrated their handy skills.

This technology project is all about learning how an electric circuit operates using a 9V battery and a resistor that

softens the current so the red LED light won't blow - while still having many years of stored voltage to play this game. Students also learn about how an electric circuit works, the operation of a switch and how to use the soldering iron safely to make all the connections

### AN UPDATE FROM THE WELLBEING TEAM

#### Mental Health Day Celebrations at JJCMHS

On the 17 October, 2019 our school celebrated the Mental Health Day by hosting a powerful talk with Josette Mouawad who shared with our students her personal journey struggling with mental health issues during her school years and how she overcame depression.

Josette shared her story and interacted with our students in a Q&A session. Our students were very engaged throughout and Josette's message was clear, powerful and created a positive impact in the general attitude towards mental health at our school. During this presentation, our school counsellor, Ms Karlina Panagiotaros, addressed the students about the ways she can support them, if and when they are dealing with difficult situations or thoughts, and talked about the importance of seeking help and support. Students were encouraged to tell loved ones that they have noticed they're behaving differently and, if worried, ask about their thoughts, then listen with empathy and without judgment.

#### Dos and don'ts



- Let your friend or loved one know you have noticed they're behaving differently.
- If you feel uncertain and that your friend or loved one may be at risk, do ask the question. Are you having thoughts about suicide? Be prepared for the answer to be yes. Then listen with empathy and without judgement.
- Make sure they're safe for now and support them to seek help.



- Don't try to talk them out of suicide by reminding them 'what they've got going for them' or how much it would hurt their friends and family.
- Don't try to fix their problems.
- Don't dismiss it as 'attention seeking'. Take them seriously and acknowledge the reasons they want to die.

#### Theatre Event – Sticks & Stones

On the 6 November, 2019 our school held a theatre play addressing bullying, cyber bullying, aggression and respectful relationships. The play was written, directed and performed by two young actors from Brainstorm Productions, who are an award-winning in-school theatre partner and their programs tackle the important issues facing our teenagers today, including the consequences of cyber bullying, risky behaviour, negative relationships, violence, prejudice, depression, eating disorders and substance abuse.

A Production of the Production

Consultation with school counsellors, teachers and education professionals ensured that the material was psychologically safe and appropriate. The performance provided insights into how students can take control of their own behaviour and lives. The play was followed by an engaging discussion for Q&A's that ensured that all of the positive messages have been received and understood by the students, cementing what they have learnt and taken from the show.

#### White Ribbon Assembly and Consent and Healthy Relationships Workshops

At JJ Cahill Memorial High School we believe that the solution to issues facing young people is through their empowerment. We focus on providing accurate information, developing critical thinking skills, and providing spaces for conversations and questions.



With that in mind, and as part of the White Ribbon Campaign - a global movement of men and boys working to end male violence against women and girls - our school celebrated healthy and caring relationships. This was through holding a special White Ribbon Assembly and by facilitating two workshops about Consent and Healthy Relationships directed to students in Years 8, 9 and 10 on the 21 and 22 of November.

In our White Ribbon Assembly we heard from our school counsellor Karlina Panagiotoros and from the Family Referral Education Worker, Amaia Delaterre about the different support and assistance that they provide to our students, families and our school community. We ended our assembly with a heartfelt pledge that united us as a community in our stance against violence against women.

#### Year 10 Work Experience


Year 10 students recently completed work experience in a workplace relevant to their goals and aspirations.
